

FIRE RISK ASSESSMENT

LEGAL REOUIREMENT

The Regulatory Reform (Fire Safety) Order 2005 requires the responsible person of a nondomestic premises to carry out a fire risk assessment.

WHEN IS IT NEEDED?

You must keep a written record of your fire risk assessment if your business employs 5 or more people.

CONSEQUENCES

Failure to follow fire safety regulations could end in fines and/or prison sentences.

FIRE SAFETY REGISTER REGISTERED ORGANISATION

A fire risk assessment identifies what is required in your premises to keep people safe and prevent fire.

It is a legal requirement to carry out a fire risk assessment for any non-domestic premises, sleeping accommodation and premises with an alcohol license.

A fire risk assessment will ensure you:

- Identify the fire hazards.
- 2 Identify people at risk.
- 8 Evaluate, remove or reduce the risks.
- 4 Record your findings, prepare an emergency plan and provide training.
- Review and update the fire risk assessment regularly.

CAN I DO MY OWN FIRE RISK ASSESSMENT?

The law does not say who is allowed to carry out a fire risk assessment. However, the person must be competent enough to complete a 'suitable and sufficient' assessment of that particular building. This may mean getting a professional fire risk assessor to carry out the assessment.

Before carrying out a fire risk assessment can you answer these following questions?

- What is the current British standard for the installation of fire extinguishers?
- How far away should an "assembly point" be?
- What is the name of the current fire legislation in the UK?
- 4. What type of fire alarm system is required in your property? L1, L2, L3, L4 or L5?
- What is the difference between a "Responsible person" and a "person with responsibilities"?
- How often should a fire risk assessment be reviewed?
- In a medium risk premises, what is the maximum travel distance permitted to an "area of relative safety"?
- 8. What is "an area of relative safety"?
- Is your premises Low, Medium or High risk? And why?
- 10. Are all void spaces adequately compartmented?
- Does the business have enough trained fire wardens?

Finally, the most important question of all...

12. Can YOUR fire risk assessment stand examination in a court of law if the worst happens?
